# It's all go for Railfuture

The rebranding of the Railway Development Society as Railfuture is paying off with new interest in our activities from the media.

Chairman Peter Lawrence has spearheaded Railfuture's message in the media, helped by Paul Krebs, Alan Bevan and Keith Dyall as well as many individuals in other branch areas.

Kate Tudor-Pole is now working full-time in our London office, with Alix Stredwick working one day a week.

The staff team is enthusiastically supported by a team of volunteers.

We have launched a programme of regular press releases, backed by Alix's monthly one-page *Railfuture Campaigner*, which aims to brief both the media and key members of *Railfuture*.

The second *Campaigner* in mid-November dealt with the future of Railtrack, pointing out, among other things, that

The national executive cleared the way for further action at a meeting on 10 November by approving a new committee and officer structure for the society.

Also approved was a policy guidelines produced by Richard Pout and a draft Railfuture strategy adopted which will be circulated to branches and committees.

General secretary Mike Crowhurst and policy adviser Richard Pout have produced submissions to the Strategic Rail Authority on franchising, to the transport select committee of the House of Commons, and to the Government's social inclusion unit. There have also been a series of lobby meetings. President Michael Caton, chairman Peter Lawrence and Peter Davies met Rail Regulator Tom Winsor. Michael Caton and Peter Lawrence saw the Confederation for British Industry while another Railfuture delegation had talks with the British Transport Police.

Railfuture member Robin Whittaker has also produced a thesis on the *Network Effects of Railway Systems* as part of his PhD work at the University of Westminster.

The national executive meanwhile has decided to put the revised RDS constitution to the annual general meeting next year.

With luck, the society may have a new membership system to replace the ground-breaking system which has been, for several years, maintained by computer officer Trevor Jones.

Railfuture branches have also been very active. An excellent four-page pamphlet *Enhancing the Rail Network in the North West* has been produced by the local branch and sent to opinion formers. It was presented to the NE in November.

#### **Station survey**

Passengers at Stowmarket station, Suffolk, were unanimous in calling for more reliable trains as a way to encourage more rail use. More than 80% thought cutting fares would also be a key to encouraging new passengers. The findings resulted from a survey carried out by Liberal Democrat district councillor Mrs Wendy Marchant who is vice-chair of the Suffolk rail policy group.

She commented: "Not only do we have high basic fares but a bewildering array of over 90 different types of ticket."

In Cumbria, Liberal Democrat Neil Hughes thanked many voters who switched to him because he supported plans to reopen Shap station on the West Coast main line. Although a Conservative was elected to the county council seat, Mr Hughes said: "I am more determined than ever to win support for public transport improvements and to get Shap station reopened."
